HOW TO EVALUATE A DRY PLACER CLAIM

Evaluating a Dry Claim:

Scope: to evaluate the potential claim for recreational or commercial use

Claim or claims to be evaluated which may be existing claims presented to purchase by an owner, or a new open area.

Gold size:

1. Nugget is the size of a green pea – may be spherical or flat.
2. A picker is the size of ½ of a piece of rice to a nugget size.
3. A flake is the size of an average grain of sand and smaller it may also be spherical or platy.
4. A piece of dust is the size of the period at the end of this sentence or smaller. (.)

Protocol- or procedure:

1. Always sample the same way if possible.
2. RECORD location at time sample is taken and tag sample GPS or obvious land mark.
3. 1 or 2 buckets to be taken for later processing, they should be screened to ½ inch or smaller number #1 top of hole #2 lower, RECORD on paper not memory.
4. If it’s too far to carry then change to ½ buckets. Number and record carefully.
5. If “good” if possible repeat.
6. **NO SAMPLE IS WORTH A DAMN IF YOU DO NOT KNOW WHERE IT CAME FROM!!!**

Sec. 1 So, where do I sample from?

You can and should take several samples along a stream bed. Firstly that soil will be easy to screen and run, and secondly if it is a good location to find gold. Treat the dry stream as you would a wet claim: sample the insides of bends, at the beginning of bars, etc. Also sample the straight runs especially if a great change in grade. You may find nothing at the lower end of straight a ways but may hit at the upper end or vice-versa. Remember it is not likely that gold will be found along the

entire length of the stream bed.

Next, look for higher bars along the stream bed. These almost are certain to exist and are easy to sample. Sample all bars. Take a sample from the up-grade end across the bar and along its length. These bars are not the same as in the stream. You may not know the beginning or end.

Sample it fully. As in wet areas these bars may be high above the current stream or may even run in a different direction. Because of the condition of the gold, (coarse or rough) its source may be close at hand, a quartz vein. A little off the subject.

In this case, sample along the banks if you find gold keep going up stream, if the gold stops the source is or was above you. You may have found a lode. Lastly, if you feel that some spot needs to be sampled, and if you have time then sample it.

But first sample the areas described above. If you go only to where it is most likely to find gold and not in a planned way you can and will, bias the report. This can result in outlays of money to purchase a claim or hour in staking for no reason. After following SEC.1 and protocol and you have time and it is legal, you might do a little high grading.

Remember if it is someone else's claim you have no right to high grade! If you are on open land and your contract will allow it, then high grade it. Keep the evaluating impartial, to withhold information so you can claim it later, or make it look better than it is, is not ethical so the report must be accurate.

How to sample a stream correctly according to the USGS Pub on placer claims:

“Choose a location, start at one bank. Dig a trench 1 foot wide and 4 inches deep, putting 2 foot long sections in a 5gal. bucket and number as No.1 and the next 2-foot long section as #2, continuing to the other bank with #3, #4 etc.

Numbered the rows and buckets as this 1-1, 1-2 etc. then start layer 2 as 2-1, 2-2, etc, ten- layer 3, then layer 4, etc.” Remember there may be more than 1 pay streak. At Fitting Nevada there were 7 pay streaks in 40 feet down to bed rock, the poorest was on the bedrock. As you reach each pay streak you need to follow it. Working correctly can be profitable, the man did this in the 1920's and said, “He made a small fortune.” And in the 1950's had not worked since.

(Gold was \$35.00 per.)

Sec2 How to process the sample:

I am going to sound redundant; a sample is 2- 5 gallon buckets if possible (see protocol) screened to 1/2 or less. If you are forced to do something different put it in your notes. Even if you see gold in the bucket process it correctly. **All ways do it the same.** It is important to quantify the amount of gold in each sample in order to

assess the richness of the site and this means all of the samples need to be processed the same.

If you have water then of course run it in water it is faster and will recover smaller gold. Though if ran properly, I believe dry washer machines will work very well to process the sample. That's a personal opinion based on 40 years of experience. If water is available then use it by all means. Panning will also work if you are good at it. A 16-inch pan can be run in 2-3 minutes. It is very important to recover all of the gold in order to evaluate the gradation and nature of the gold at the site-from dust to pickers to nuggets. One last thought, if the owner of the claim is not interested in what you have found, then the gold they evaluate finds is his, but if the owner wants it, it is his by ownership. In keeping with integrity of your report if you run 10 samples, there should be 10 samples for all to see. This will give all that are involved in the obtaining the claim a chance to see what is there and to judge the claims value.

Sec. 3 Background information:

Both claims offered for sale and open land offers have different problems. Existing claims require careful verification of location prior to evaluation and true ownership. It is important that you know where you are at, at all times. If you do not know where you are you cannot evaluate the area.

Under the 1872 mining law the claim marker is always the location of the claim. The notice of the location and, papers at the county recorder and also the BLM need to be checked. The claim has to be “reasonably close “the where it is supposed to be. Paper work should be checked, Use the BLM LR2000 to check the area also the county Plate Maps and the BLM maps. Always look for claim corner markers and the claim monument.

Open land, as I said in the last part of the above section, make sure the land is open also that it is not private or a patented claim. If the land has been worked before then you know minerals were found there in the past; but has it all been worked out, what was the price of gold then at today's price, it may be viable now. Land that has not been worked before still may have GOLD, look at the land and use the above information and sample the dry steam and the alluvial fan, etc.

With regards to open land, First task is to assess the geomorphic environment (lay of the land) you are working in. First, we need to know how dry placers are formed and there enrichment. Generally speaking, water causes erosion at dry will be sporadic in nature-it only comes infrequently and in burst with thunder storms. In the desert, water generally appears as either run off, from rain-on-snow weather events or in cloud bursts. Each of these events results in two separate erosional events- one is a rapid burst in which the flow does not generally follow any channel and results in flowage across the entire desert floor and the

second event is the follow up flow as the burst flow ebbs. The follow up flow usually will follow stream channels and result in the channel characteristic we see when we walk up the desert channel.

Rain events between cloud bursts will generally result in continuous flow down the channels which mimic the second flow of burst events and will intensify the appearance of the stream channel being created by a continuous flow with bends, channels, bars, etc – all stream bed characteristics associated with wet claims. However these secondary rain events generally do not move much gold. Most dry claims are re-enriched differently than wet claims. While wet claims re-enrich by flood or high flow events either cutting the source in the streambed or moving the existing placer in the bed further downstream, many times dry claims will find their enrichment occurring as a result of the flash flow off the stream banks into the channel. This does not mean you will not find a source being cut by the Channel, but the flash flow nearly always represents the enrichment scheme as it moves generally stable, non-eroding material into the streambed. This soil contains the mineral for which we are looking. If the source is cut by the channel it may be an ancient channel, check and sample it may be your source of gold.

The problem we face though is that the flash flow is of a very high energy nature. As the result of that, then, the flash flow will want to cut and scour everything in its path.

It is good because it moves a lot of material (including gold) into and along the streambed. This is bad because it affects the whole streambed and its banks. That means that the gold under the flash flow moves everywhere (with some concentrating into the stream channel). The subsequent low flows following the flash flow will re-configure the streambed into the meandering form we are used to, but that does not mean that the gold move the flash flow is all there or in the streambed at all in any appreciable amount.

Sec.4 So, where is the gold?:

The old saying gold is where you find it that very well applies to dry placers. There probably should be at least 2 trips to a location to provide enough time to evaluate the property. The first: to evaluate what is there and determine where to sample.

A second: to take the samples and determine if there is enough gold to be worth working.

As many sites, should be evaluated as can be done correctly. With a claim you may ask the owner about the claim, where did he find gold? and if, he really wants to sell, he will help.

However, he might try to deceive you by sending you to a place he has salted with gold. Also remember all gold is his and if he wants it, give it to him. It can also happen that he may try to salt your samples do not leave him alone with

them.

Previous work can be a sign that all the gold has been recovered (unlikely) so sample the piles, they may have brought up lower layers of gravel, also exposing these layers, If there is a backhoe cut sample it, they may have passed through a streak of gold. Sometimes they push piles with a bulldozer to work the ground below and these piles may have gold in them.

In Spring Valley where they dredged in the early 1900's the over burden was moved and piled up, these piles are laced with pickers, unfortunately it is claimed. (I let it go, all bad). Work with care as to safety and full recovery of the gold.

I believe all samples should be kept separate and run separately.
